We started the year off collaborating with the Concordia Ukrainian Students Union by tabling together at the Montreal Ukrainian Festival and hosting a welcome back to school BBQ. These were nice opportunities to meet new members and make new friends. Then we collaborated with several of the other European cultural clubs to co-host an apartment crawl event that centered around learning about each culture's music, food and games.



The rest of the first semester we hosted events centered around sharing the Ukrainian culture and history. We hosted a perogy making workshop and made around 500, which we later sold on campus during a varenyky sale. Then for Holodomor Remembrance we did a screening of Bitter Harvest. These were educational experiences to shed light on Ukrainian culture and history, that sparked interest for members outside of the club to learn more.

Then we had the chance to be involved within the Montreal Ukrainian Community by attending community wide events. A couple representatives from the club attended the Ukrainian Canadian Congress National Leadership Dinner through the generous sponsorship of Ukrainian National Federation of Canada. We also had a group of members attend the annual Cym-Plast's Malanka in January. These were great opportunities to make connections and see the bigger picture of how we can be involved in our community outside of school today and when we graduate.



Recently, in the second semester we have held a couple of social events to just hang out and get to know our members better. We organized a games night playing Jenga and card games such as Durak. Then co-hosted the

A YEAR IN REVIEW

For the first half of the 2018-2019 school year our student group was focused on getting some logistics organized. The last couple years there has not been too much activity in our student group, so the fall term was spent revamping the group, establishing an executive team, and planning a few events for the coming Winter term.

Our first event of the year was our annual perogy lunch at the beginning of November. St. Andrews sponsors this event each year to help us out a little bit, and it lowers the cost of the perogies for the students. This year we charged \$3 for a plate of six perogies and had about 70 people come out to our lunch time event. Everyone had a great time enjoying some delicious perogies.

For Holodomor Awareness week, we set up a table of educational posters and information about Holodomor. We spent a few hours in the hall educating fellow students about the horrific famine that occurred in Ukraine in 1930s. It is tragic event that occurred that definitely does not get discussed enough, and it is important to spread its awareness.

In February we organized our Postcards for Prisoners with the support of SUSK. The event was dedicated to raising awareness of Ukrainian prisoners unjustly incarcerated in Russian prisons. We had an amazing opportunity to provide moral support to the prisoners by writing postcards to them. We organized a table in our university to spread awareness and educate students, and being able to write these postcards. We also held a workshop to write more postcards, unfortunately we were not able to get as many students to come, but we still managed to send approximately 70 postcards to the Ukrainian prisoners.

In the middle of March we planned an Escape room with our members. We had 10 people come out and had a great time working together to escape Grandma's Attic, which we successfully did!

Our last event of the year was our Bake Sale, with all of our proceeds going to Oseredok – the Ukrainian Cultural and Educational Center in Winnipeg. The bake sale was

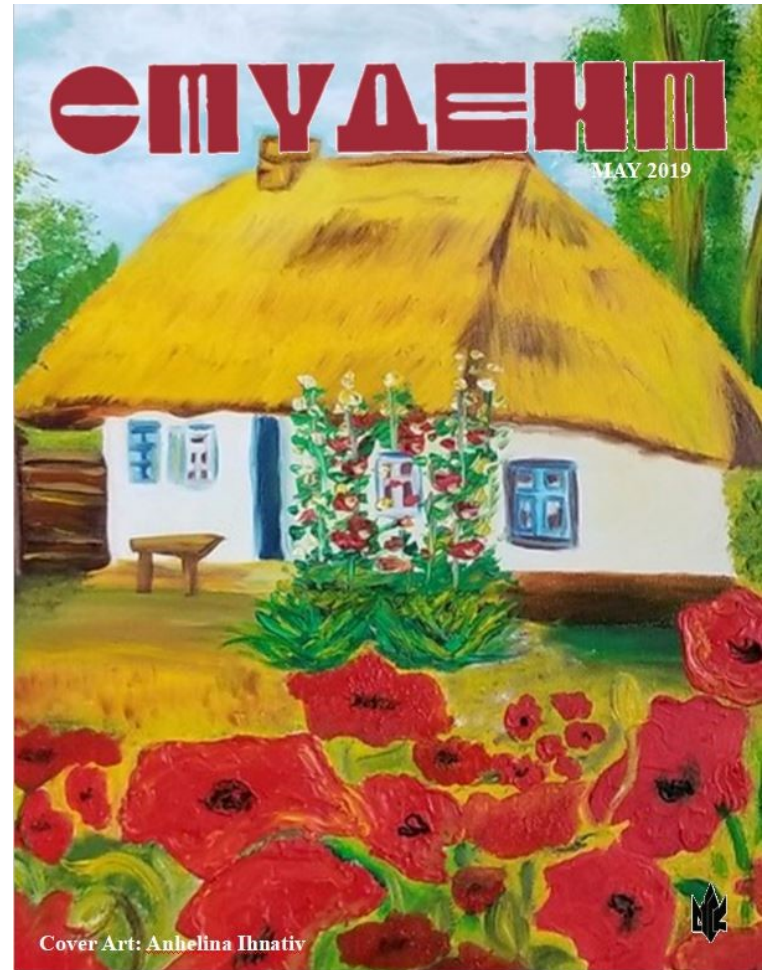
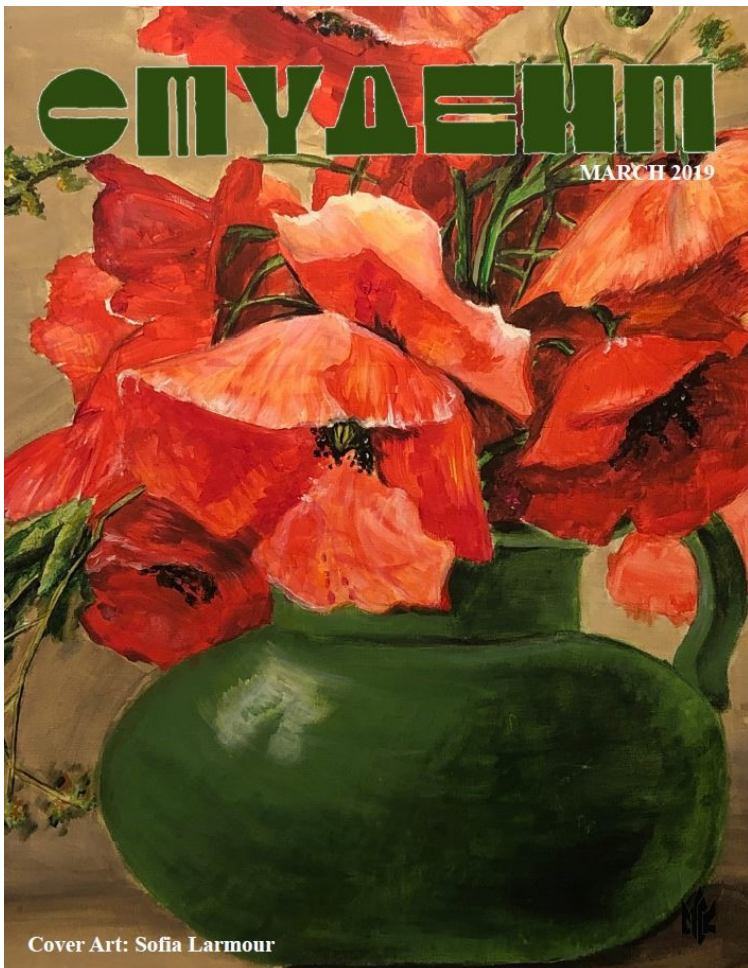
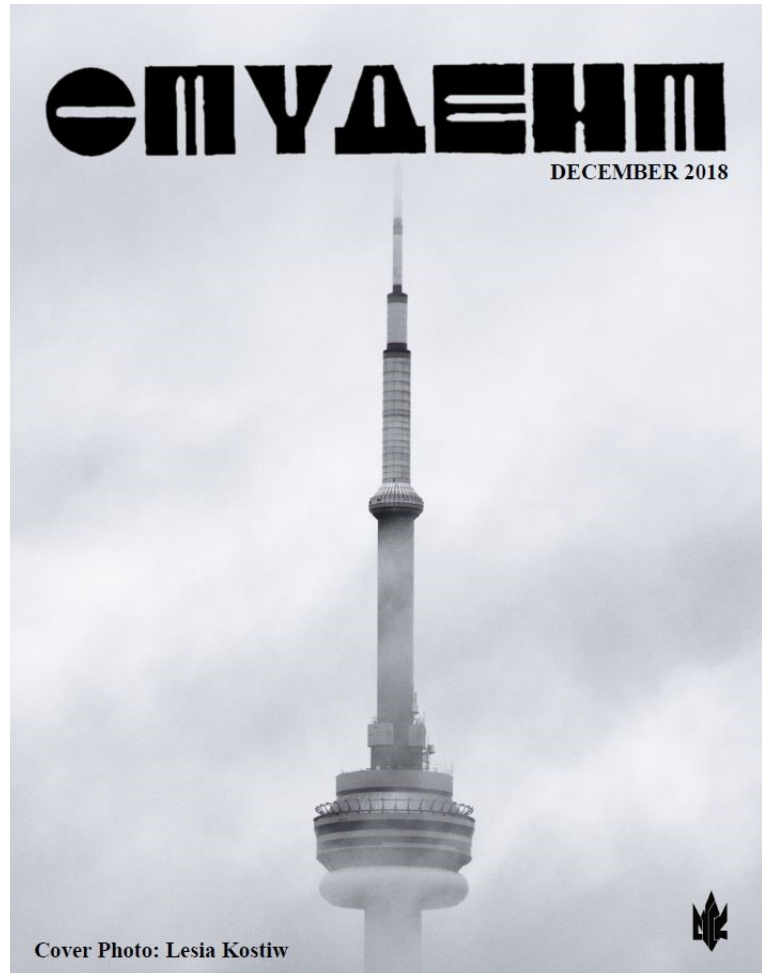
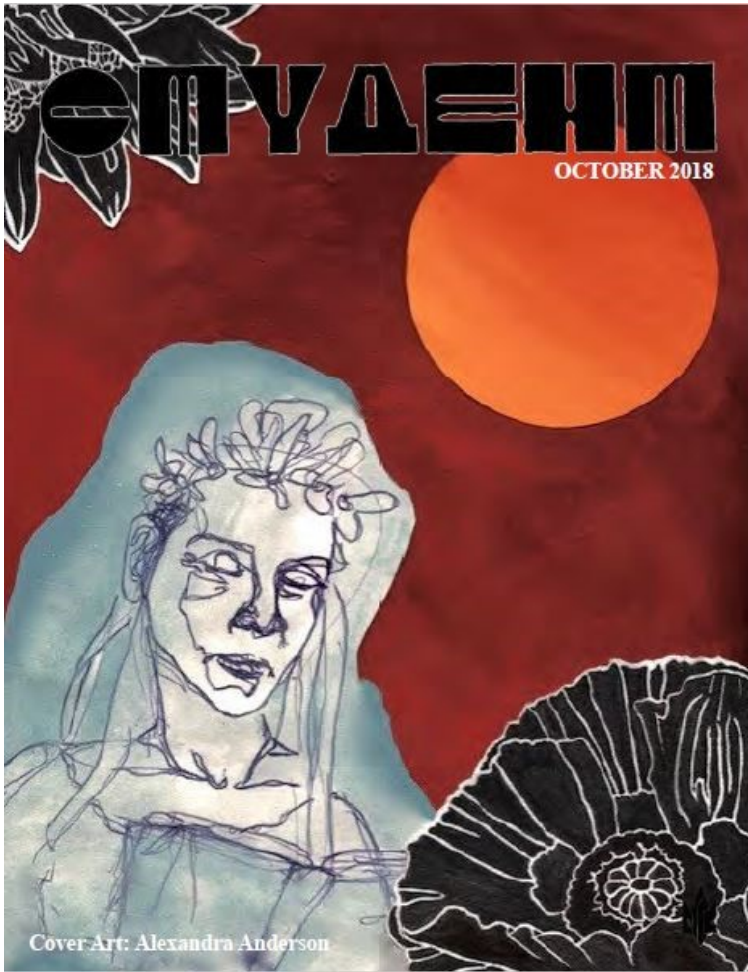


UNIVERSITY OF WINNIPEG UKRAINIAN STUDENTS' ASSOCIATION SING-ALONG

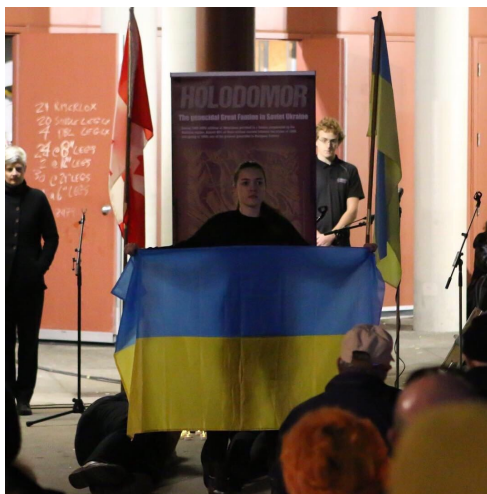
